Hanukkah

- From 168 165 BC, a revolt led by the Maccabee family successfully drove the Syrian occupation forces from Israel.
- Read 1 Maccabees.
- Upon re-capturing Jerusalem, they cleaned out the Temple, which had been made a pagan shrine, and re-started Mosaic rituals.
- Due to the war, they had only one day's oil.
- The oil lasted eight days, until they were resupplied.

Kwaanza

- Invented in 1966 in Long Beach, CA
- Celebrates African heritage from December 26 January 1.
- Has seven candles to represent Unity, Selfdetermination, Collective Work and Responsibility, Cooperative Economics, Purpose, Creativity, and Faith.
- Kwaanza is Swahili for "fruit of the harvest"
